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(FPC) launched in early 2016 to provide education, training and support for advanced perioperative practitioners in their role as members of the extended surgical team.

The Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh (RCSEd) felt it was important to recognise the standards that have been achieved by this important group of non-medical members of the surgical workforce, who provide excellent continuity of care to our patients, as well as assistance to the operating surgeon.

The Faculty was created to support the complete modern surgical team and we want to welcome perioperative practitioners to join and be part of one of the largest and oldest (and friendliest!) of the Royal Surgical Colleges in the UK.

As part of my role in promoting the Faculty, I have had the pleasure of working closely in partnership with the Association for Perioperative Practitioners (AfPP) with whom we have held two conferences, who have accredited our courses and who have active representation on our Advisory Boards group. We also have a reciprocal arrangement with the Faculty of Physician Associates (RCP) London.

In addition, I have been visiting and lecturing at universities who run courses leading to modules and degrees for students / trainee surgical care practitioners (SCPs) and surgical first assistants (SFAs). In my visits to date, I have heard ongoing concerns relating to the provision of CPD and the lack of a database or register of practitioners, such as SCPs, and heard of the need for clarity of the exact role of SFAs which has now been addressed through the Perioperative Care Collaborative SFA position statement 2018. We have recently extended free affiliate membership to



MSC students in surgical care practice for the duration of their course at the above universities.

Our Faculty gives perioperative practitioners access to a wide range of RCSEd membership benefits, including access to bespoke discounted courses and online resources. It is important that the Faculty continues to provide education, training and set standards for these practitioners and the College is committed to supporting this group as part of the surgical team.



Professional Development Courses to Support Perioperative Practitioners

Since the Faculty of Perioperative Care (FPC) launched, it has developed and successfully run a number of bespoke courses targeted specifically at perioperative practitioners.

It is important to recognise that attendance and signing off at three of these courses, in addition to a PG diploma (or evidence of an education or training role for the more established practitioner) could qualify perioperative practitioners for full Faculty membership and postnominals MFPCEd. Basic Surgical Skills (Edinburgh)

UK and internationally: Birmingham, Edinburgh, Liverpool, Manchester and more

This two-day course aimed at SCPs, FY1 and above, is designed to instil core surgical skills at the very start of a surgeon's training by teaching the correct basic techniques. These courses are run from our Surgical Skills Centre in Edinburgh eight times per year and from centres across the UK and internationally.

Perioperative Care Practitioners Intraoperative Non-Technical Skills (PINTS)

Run twice a year: Birmingham and Edinburgh

This one-day course enables perioperative care practitioners (PCPs) and surgical first assistants (SFAs) to improve their intra-operative performance and help them observe and rate intra-operative non-technical skills. After completing this course you will recognise the importance of nontechnical skills of all team members during operative surgery; discuss the underlying principles of the nontechnical skills which underpin good surgical performance as it relates to scrub practitioners, surgical first assistants, surgical care practitioners.

Leadership and Development

Run twice a year: Birmingham and Edinburgh

This course will help participants to develop self-awareness of their learning styles, individual strengths and development needs. It will also discuss service improvement including writing business cases and discuss areas such as time management and work life balance. (This course has been accredited by the AfPP Education Reference Group.)

Care of the Critically III Surgical Patient (CCrISP)

UK: Edinburgh, Cardiff and more

The CCrISP course is primarily aimed at CT1 or early CT2 and also welcomes surgical care practitioners (SCPs). It provides instruction in the practical management of critically ill surgical patients of all types. The course emphasises a systematic approach to the assessment and management of these patients and their problems that, if used in conjunction with clinical expertise and appropriate attention to clinical detail, should ultimately help prevent the development of serious complications and multiple organ failure. The course is delivered by lectures, practical/active workshops and group discussion.

Perioperative Key Skills Course

Run twice a year: Edinburgh

Basic surgical skills are fundamental to the practice of safe surgery. The surgical first assistant is an extremely important member of the operating team who needs to be familiar with the basic procedures in open, laparoscopic and robotic surgery as well as the dynamics of the theatre environment.

Principles of Surgical Anatomy

Run annually in Edinburgh

Surgical Assistance Survey



The Faculty of Perioperative Care conducted a survey of surgical assistance across the UK. Against the backdrop of anecdotal evidence of strain in the system, the survey aimed to capture how assistance is being provided across the UK and where any problems and solutions may lie. The survey of surgical consultants, specialty doctors and senior trainees across all specialties received 332 responses for analysis. The survey suggests the theatre workforce is under pressure and that high quality assistance from the surgical care practitioner, surgical first assistant and physician associate workforce may form part of the solution.

The survey identified that across the UK 25% of surgeons are currently unsatisfied with the level of assistance they are receiving in theatre and 43% of respondents stated that a second assistant was not always available for major cases if required. Rota problems, staff shortages and working time regulations were common reasons given for inconsistent teams. 61% of survey participants stated that non-medical practitioners were working within theatres in their hospitals; with regular involvement in assisting major cases. In keeping with previous studies the survey suggests that, where employed, the non-medical workforce provide a standard of work comparable to that of experienced surgical trainees.

The survey does suggest ongoing uncertainty about the potential impact the non-medical workforce could have on surgical training but it is clear that specialties with more established programmes such as cardiothoracics and orthopaedics have a more favourable outlook than less well established programmes. Similarly, surgeons appear to see more of the beneficial aspects as they become more senior in training. Going forward, the Faculty of Perioperative Care plans to work to develop guidelines for effective and mutually beneficial coworking.
