The Faculty of **Perioperative Care**

The Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh (RCSEd) established the Faculty of Perioperative Care in 2016 in recognition of the evolving and increasingly important role that perioperative practitioners play as part of the wider surgical team in delivering safe, surgical care to patients. The Faculty is open to all perioperative practitioners in the UK, including trainees, Surgical Care Practitioners (SCPs) and Surgical First Assistants (SFAs) and all those with similar titles involved in the delivery of high-quality surgical care.

The Faculty holds an annual conference for perioperative practitioners, offers courses, webinars and podcasts and provides online resources to support the extended surgical team. It works in partnership with the Association for Perioperative Practitioners and has developed close relationships with universities who run degree courses for SCPs and SFAs. More recently, the Faculty has partnered with the Royal College of Surgeons of England to develop a Curriculum Framework for SCPs and to introduce a Managed Voluntary Register for SCPs. Collectively, these initiatives establish and communicate the standards for the postgraduate education of SCPs and their ongoing professional development.

The Faculty was ably led by Mr Charles Auld from its inception and he was integral to its establishment and development. He was replaced as FPC lead by Mrs Juliette Murray in October 2022. Juliette is currently Associate Clinical Director at the Centre for Sustainable Delivery and Deputy Medical Director in NHS Forth Valley. Previous roles include Deputy Director of Medical Education and Strategic Cancer Lead in NHS Lanarkshire where she had a significant role in teaching and training both medical staff and advanced practitioners.

The Faculty continues to provide education and training, and set standards for these practitioners and the College is committed to supporting this group as part of the surgical team.

We welcome all perioperative practitioners to join and become part of one of the largest and oldest Royal Surgical Colleges in the UK.



Professional Development Courses to Support Perioperative Practitioners

Since the Faculty of Perioperative Care (FPC) launched, it has developed and successfully run a number of bespoke courses targeted specifically at perioperative practitioners.

It is important to recognise that attendance and signing off at three of these courses, in addition to a PG diploma (or evidence of an education or training role for the more established practitioner) could qualify perioperative practitioners for full Faculty membership and postnominals MFPCEd. Basic Surgical Skills

UK and internationally: Birmingham, Liverpool, Manchester and more

This two-day course aimed at SCPs, FY1 and above, is designed to instil core surgical skills at the very start of a surgeon's training by teaching the correct basic techniques. These courses are run on a monthly basis in several locations across the UK and internationally.

Ultrasound Venous Scan Assessment

26 November 2023, Birmingham

The aim of this two- day course is to demonstrate the utility of the ultrasound doppler machine to scan the greater and short saphenous vein for Coronary Artery Bypass Grafting (CABG) surgery. Delegates will be trained and assessed on the use of the technology in harvesting a good conduit.

Non-Technical Skills for Surgeons (NOTSS)

16 March 2023, Edinburgh 30 June 2023, Birmingham

This is a one-day course for consultant surgeons and post-CCT trainees from all surgical specialties. The course examines the non-technical skills which underpin good operative performance using short talks, video simulated scenarios, an audience response voting system, and small group discussions. At the end of the course participants will be able to understand the theories and research relating to adverse events in surgery and the importance of the non-technical skills in improving performance. Attendees will also be able to use the NOTSS taxonomy to observe, rate, and provide feedback on behaviours in the operating room.

Perioperative Care Webinars

A webinar series for non-medical practitioners brought to you by The Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh in association with the RCSEd Faculty of Perioperative Care.

CPD is important for all non-medical practitioners in the surgical team (eg. SCP, ACP and SFA) to ensure their knowledge, technical and non-technical skills are kept up to date with current practice. RCSEd is the first College to develop a series of webinars specifically for this group which will complement the courses and the annual conference already run by the Faculty of Perioperative Care at the College.

Surgical Assistance Survey



The Faculty of Perioperative Care conducted a survey of surgical assistance across the UK. Against the backdrop of anecdotal evidence of strain in the system, the survey aimed to capture how assistance is being provided across the UK and where any problems and solutions may lie. The survey of surgical consultants, specialty doctors and senior trainees across all specialties received 332 responses for analysis. The survey suggests the theatre workforce is under pressure and that high quality assistance from the surgical care practitioner, surgical first assistant and physician associate workforce may form part of the solution.

The survey identified that across the UK 25% of surgeons are currently unsatisfied with the level of assistance they are receiving in theatre and 43% of respondents stated that a second assistant was not always available for major cases if required. Rota problems, staff shortages and working time regulations were common reasons given for inconsistent teams. 61% of survey participants stated that non-medical practitioners were working within theatres in their hospitals; with regular involvement in assisting major cases. In keeping with previous studies the survey suggests that, where employed, the non-medical workforce provide a standard of work comparable to that of experienced surgical trainees.

The survey does suggest ongoing uncertainty about the potential impact the non-medical workforce could have on surgical training but it is clear that specialties with more established programmes such as cardiothoracics and orthopaedics have a more favourable outlook than less well established programmes. Similarly, surgeons appear to see more of the beneficial aspects as they become more senior in training. Going forward, the Faculty of Perioperative Care plans to work to develop guidelines for effective and mutually beneficial coworking.
